## "May Ayim – A Black Internationalist"



Dr. Tiffany Florvil is author of <u>Mobilizing</u> <u>Black Germany: Afro-German Women and the</u> <u>Making of a Transnational Movement</u> (forthcoming with University of Illinois Press) and coeditor of <u>Rethinking Black</u> <u>German Studies: Approaches, Interventions</u> <u>and Histories</u>.

Afro-German writer and activist May Ayim pursued political activism across the globe. Influenced by Audre Lorde, Ayim, along with others, ushered in the modern Black German movement of the 1980s and 1990s in Germany. Traversing borders, Ayim forged kinships with individuals across the diaspora, People of Color, and white allies. These transnational exchanges helped her achieve recognition as one of the most promising Afro-German activist-intellectuals and performers of her generation.
